President's MESSAGE

One way we will get through it is by connecting online. I am proud of how quickly our team of professionals and volunteers launched Maccabi USA @ Home, a virtual community engaging our alumni and the broader Jewish American sports community.

And, while the Maccabiah will be one year further down the road, we will pray for the plague of COVID-19 to be in the rear-view mirror as soon as possible.

So, to everyone in our beloved Maccabi community, I say: God Bless America, Maccabi Chai, and Chazak Ve-ematz! Be Courageous and Strong!

CEO's MESSAGE

As I walked through the sprawling DC Convention Center at this year's AIPAC Policy Conference, the questions came flying at me: Which Maccabiah were you in? What sport did you play? Where can I get one of those?

Whether it was my bright red Adidas backpack with the Maccabi USA logo and the Stars and Stripes or my grey Adidas quarter-zip with the Maccabi USA logo, people were excited to see reminders of Maccabi USA (and were perhaps a tad envious of our sporty swag). Athletes, parents, coaches, and grandparents alike came up to me eager for connection.

Maccabi USA has an amazing track record of providing meaningful connection for our athletes, volunteers, and supporters. We know from our surveys that people who experience the Games are deeply impacted. Eighty-nine percent of athletes who hadn't been to Israel before considered the Maccabiah a lifechanging experience (plus 82% of those who had prior Israel experience). Ninety-eight percent would recommend participating in the Games to a friend.

And while we don't (yet) have a long-term study of our alumni, we know anecdotally that participation in a Maccabi Games is an experience that sticks with you. Since arriving in July, I have been the recipient of numerous memories and reflections from alumni who represented the US decades ago. They share how deeply the experience impacted their lives and the life-long connections they've made with teammates and competitors.

Given the impact we have on those who join one of our delegations, a key set of questions looms for Maccabi USA: How do we make that experience attainable for more people?

Can we offer opportunities in between the Games that somehow generate similar feelings of connection for new athletes? How do we stay connected with our alumni once they return from their experience?

We know that 43% of athletes applied for need-based scholarship (and another 17% for merit-based) in advance of the 2017 Maccabiah and we were able to give out \$1.2 million in financial support. But what about the people who saw the price tag at the start of the process and didn't apply? Or those whose scholarship wasn't large enough to make the numbers work?

Similar questions could and should be asked for our other delegation members beyond our athletes. We currently require our volunteers – coaches, doctors, and team managers – to pay \$3000 to serve in those critical roles during the Games. How many great volunteers do we lose to other paying (or at least financially neutral) opportunities?

All of these existential questions – and many more!
– are being asked as part of the Strategic Planning process Maccabi USA is currently undertaking (see page 5). Embedded in that process is an exploration of our financial model – everything we currently do and all that we aspire to do is predicated upon a strong financial picture. It is clear from conversations and analysis over the last nine months that while we may be able to get by in the short term, our financial model is in need of an overhaul in the long term if we are to be successful in Maccabi USA's next 70 years.

A stronger financial picture would help us answer many of the questions posed above. We could confidently commit to a need-blind application process for our athletes. We could reduce the need for volunteers to pay for the privilege of volunteering their time. We could think creatively and expansively about engaging the American Jewish community through the lens of sport, outside the four Games we participate in every four years. We could invest in a robust alumni network to keep our delegation members connected beyond their participation in one of our events. And more.

We are asking these hard but proactive questions to ensure that at every Jewish conference this century, athletes, alumni, and community members keep asking the most important question for our work:

Can I tell you how transformative Maccabi USA has been for me?

Planning for our Future

The mission and focus of Maccabi USA has evolved over the course of our 70+ years. Founded in 1948 as the United States Committee Sports for Israel to advocate for Israel's inclusion in the Olympics, we have grown to become the official United States Territorial Organization of the global Maccabi Movement. In this role we have successfully organized delegations to international Maccabi events, including the single largest traveling sports delegation (1131)



strong!) of any kind to any event ever for the 20th Maccabiah in 2017.

As we continue to look towards the future, our leadership recognized the need to carefully and intentionally prepare for the next phase in our history as we grow to better serve not only our Maccabi community but the American (and global) Jewish communities. To ensure that we shape our organization to both honor our past and position ourselves for future success, we have embarked on a Strategic Planning process in collaboration with an outside consultant to carefully chart the path forward. Chaired by Arnie Fielkow and Toni Wortman, our process has captured feedback and perspective from all stakeholders groups (e.g. athletes, coaches, volunteers, families, funders, board members, and staff) through various data gathering methods. We are currently in the midst of distilling what we learned and charting our direction across four major themes that emerged. We look forward to sharing the resulting Strategic Plan with you later this year!

Lev L'Lev (Heart to Heart, our community service project) Co-Chairs Sharon Lifschutz and Michael Monheit are collaborating with the IC planning team on a full delegation day for Lev L'Lev program. And, for the first time ever Master's teams will be invited to join us for the last two days and participate in the Magerman B'nai mitzvah ceremony and our team luncheon.

Our supporters' mission chaired by Shayna Weiss, Stacey Klimchuk and Jeanie Milbauer, will provide programs for all levels of participation amongst our parents and VIP's, spread throughout Israel as our athletes will compete all over the country.

And yes, the Games, the third-largest multi-sport event in the world will be truly special. We are

planning a delegation of 1250 members all going for the GOLD - from Juniors through Grand Masters. Hubs established around Israel, Juniors in Haifa, Open in Jerusalem, and Masters in Netanya will make this an experience to remember for their lifetime.

As General Chair I am proud and honored to lead our delegation into **Teddy Stadium** for the Opening Ceremony. It will be a great moment seeing the USA delegation wrapped around the track as we enter the standing-roomonly stadium. Monumental!

Enhanced 15RAEL Connect



Starting as a two-day pre-camp in 1985, Maccabi USA's Israel Connect (IC) grew to become a six-day cultural-educational program in 2001. Over the last 35 years, it has evolved into the educational cornerstone of the Maccabiah experience, enabling our athletes to connect with the history, culture, and people of Israel in the week before the Opening Ceremony.

In 2017, we engaged the Brandeis University Cohen Center for Modern Jewish Studies to conduct a rigorous program evaluation of the Maccabiah experience to create a data-based approach to program improvements. The great success, as documented in the Brandeis Study, is that Maccabi USA builds powerful and lasting Jewish connections through IC and the Maccabiah. The majority felt that their overall Maccabiah experience was a life-changing encounter with Israel and their Jewish heritage. Feedback consistently indicated that the highlight of the experience is the people they met and the positive relationships they formed. This building of Jewish community is the fundamental strategy towards accomplishing the organizational vision of 'Building Jewish Pride Through Sports'. The study also enabled us to identify ways to enhance IC to make the experience more impactful while still enabling the athletes to prepare for elite competition on the world stage. We are excited to incorporate these changes as we prepare for the next Maccabiah!

One key enhancement is the creation of a Maccabi USA Israel Connect Curriculum developed by experts in the field of Israel education. Starting with the outcome goals of building connections with other participants, to Israel and Israelis, and to overall Jewish peoplehood, experiential venues will be selected to provide a forum in which to facilitate ongoing dialogue. Another key enhancement is the creation of a Maccabi Educator Fellowship Program, a select team of trained professional educators adept at engaging US high school and college students. This cohort of educators will engage athletes during IC itself and continue activities during the two weeks of the Maccabiah.

An important enhancement designed to increase the sense of connection between our delegation and the people of Israel is the expansion of Maccabi USA Lev L'Lev (Heart to Heart) Program, our signature Tikun Olam effort, to include all junior, youth and open athletes during IC.

A final goal is to promote more opportunities for our Masters athletes to engage with our overall delegation. To accomplish this, the 21st Maccabiah IC will include an opportunity for Masters athletes to join the experience and connect meaningfully with the rest of the delegation before the Games begin.

We look forward to rolling out these changes and ushering Israel Connect into the next chapter in its evolution!

Building the Maccabi Community

My dear friends at Maccabi USA!

I have been fortunate to serve as your Israeli Shaliach emissary for the past two-and-a-half years. During this time, I have had the opportunity to be part of Maccabi USA's professional team during Games in Mexico, Budapest, and Israel and to help develop special programs and engagement opportunities for our American Maccabi community.



These programs emphasize our responsibility and obligation to the next generation of Jewish athletes, our athletes with physical disabilities, and our alumni. I'm excited to share with you some of these new ways we are building Jewish pride through sports.

With the help of Maccabi
USA's Para-sports chair Stuart
Greenberg we launched Maccabi
Access. This program was a
10-day sports and educational
journey in Israel for Jewish
wheelchair basketball players.
In May 2019, eight Maccabi
players from all over the country
traveled with me to Israel to
compete against their Israeli
counterparts. We played four
games against Israeli wheelchair
Basketball teams, toured the

country north to south, and enjoyed exceptional hospitality at the various sports centers in Israel. Our athletes came home with a deeper understanding of their Jewish heritage and a feeling of connection to the Israeli Jewish para-basketball community.

In August 2019, following the vision of Maccabi USA's Wrestling chair Chris Feder, we held the first ever international wrestling training camp for Jewish teens in Israel. This program served a new age group that is not a part of the Maccabiah and helps create a community of outstanding Jewish wrestlers for future games. Thanks to our great relationship with the Israeli Wrestling Association and generous support of several individuals we were able to bring together a team of ten teens aged
